After Pearl Harbor, airlines provided cockpit crews to ferry supplies. I was one of the Braniff Airways radio operators enlisted as a CW op (Air Corps Enlisted Reserve).

The airlines turned aircraft over to the government. I flew east from Dallas TX in a Braniff Airways DC-2 which had been stripped of seats, and as I remember I grabbed anything I could to keep from sliding to the rear on takeoff. Eventually to Mitchell Field to Presque Isle Maine and Goose Bay Labrador. There I was introduced to a C-47 operator position.

I started out on the Goose Bay-Greenland leg. Many aircraft took off and by today's standard, we were crawling along. Two Braniff operator accounts follow.

On the trip east from Dallas TX we had to overnight in Knoxville, TN as the navigation lights on the old DC-2 were out. I worked all night but never isolated the short that was blowing the fuse. I never had the same crew twice on the Greenland runs. On the ships that I flew we had about 4 to 6 inches of condensed food in the bottom of the cargo bin behind the co-pilot seat.

These were so hard you had to bang on them with a hunting knife. On the run to Greenland we all got hungry and decided to try one of the bars. They should have been called bricks. I stood on the knife while another guy guided it to cut through the bar to make smaller pieces. All you could do was suck on it to soften it a little then rake your teeth over it to shave off some of the food. The label warned as to the speed you could consume the bar without getting indigestion due to the high food concentration.

We left Presque Isle with a load to Goose Bay. On arrival at Goose Bay the weather had closed in on Presque Isle and we waited to return. A short time later they decoded the weather as 9000 and 9 miles so we took off. Over the St. Lawrence River, after being challenged by Presque Isle they came on and said: "Here is the we---" and his signal went off. The captain said the range went off also. I think there were 4 planes in the flight, one plane sat down in a wheat field. I asked the CW op on the flight to report on the ground but the Capt. would not let him use the ship battery so we were not sure he got down. We finally got the Presque Isle tower but our codes had expired and couldn't get the weather in the clear. All he could say was to head inland to the west for better weather. The main power cable to the field had been cut. Someone drove a spike through the cable!

To make it more interesting, our range receiver and the direction finder was now out and our ship compass was off but we did not know how much or which way! I tuned the ranges we needed in on the communications receiver that fortunately had the range band. Later the Captain told the Canadian officials, "We had a radioman and not a knob twister on board" and gave me credit for navigating the ship to Montreal. That was perhaps the best compliment I have ever received.

Over the St. Lawrence River the captain asked the crew chief to dump one cabin tank into the mains but he misunderstood and dumped them both. Later when he asked for the other one to be dumped into the mains we discovered we were flying with no reserve cabin tank fuel. The captain ordered the chutes readied. I picked out four chutes with the latest packing date. I had never had a chute on let alone jump! The captain chose the lightest man to be the last one out, me. Back then I could turn sideways and not be seen, tipping the scales around 100 pounds, so I would be the last to leave.

We were about ready to jump when the copilot thought he saw some lights. It was Montreal, but where was the airport? We used the communications set on the tower frequency. (The tower asked us to reduce the transmit power!) The tower located us by our landing lights. Three of our 4 tanks were empty and we were rocking the ship to get that last drop of fuel. When they filled the tanks for our return to Presque Isle they put in 800 gallons. The fuel tanks (201,201,210,210) hold a total of 822. At 95 gallons per hour, it was close. -continued next page-

I do well remember standing alongside the BW-1 up-grade landing strip listening to the voice communications with Hal's (BNF op Harold Vester) crew on their approach, hoping to high heaven that they would make it into the strip OK. I was surely glad when I saw them break out of the OVC and head for the runway.

Those were wild days for all of us. I spent my time with a crew of AAL pilots, then finally with some guys from Pennsylvania Central Airlines (which later became Capitol Airlines). Our crossing was pretty uneventful as I recall, except that the QRM on 8200 was horrible with all the brand-new military radio ops trying to work BW-1 at the same time. I spent most of my time copying the WX coded in SYKO. I turned down a trip from BW-1 to BW-8 with the AAL guys, as I was tired, dirty and hungry and just wanted to get back to civilization! I regret it, as would have liked to see the sun rise over the Greenland Ice Cap.

First licensed in high school in 1960 as K4WOE (Tech, 5WPM). I enjoyed a few years of building and using equipment at a time when home-brewing equipment was commonplace. Like many who grew up in the fifties, I trace my "roots" of interest beginning with things like crystal radio, short-wave listening, experiments, and building electronic projects out of parts from defunct radio and television sets. LETTER TO THE EDITOR QRQ Calling Frequency?

Many CW operators who like to work at speeds over 25 words per minute with bugs, side-swipers, or electronic devices should be able to get together somewhere on CW bands to find higher speed QSOs. This would allow operators who have not reached faster speeds yet to have the remainder of the CW bands to work on slower QSOs and upgrading their speed.

In general, most CW DXing is done at the low frequency end of our bands, either in the lowest 10 kHz of the CW bands, or in the Extra Class CW segment, or near these portions. So, for general QRQ type QSOs, moving about ± 17 kHz above either the top of the 10 kHz DX band limit or above the Extra Class band limit, would seem to be a good frequency choice. This would miss the multiple of 5 kHz, and the half-way-in-between frequencies that many groups tend to pick to set up a net or sked. If a "QRQ Calling Frequency," like the "AM Calling Frequency" on 80, 40 and 20 m is to be used, when a contact is first made, the two stations should select a nearby clear "working frequency" and both QSY to it. This allows others to now call "CQ QRQ" on the calling frequency. Such a system has worked well on the International 500 kHz calling frequency for ± 100 years. If two amateur stations forget to QSY, then 1 kHz on either side could be used as a temporary QRQ calling frequency. This keeps the QRQ QSOs close together and away from other parts of the CW bands. Suggested QRQ calling frequencies for all CW classes would be:

160 m 1817 kHz	80 m 3542 kHz	40 m 7042 kHz	30 m 10117 kHz
20 m 14042 kHz	17 m 18085 kHz	15 m 21042 kHz	12 m 24907 kHz
10 m 28017 kHz			

For Extra Class operators, a QRQ calling frequency 17 kHz above the Extra Class lower band limit on 80, 40, 20, and 15 m would interfere with many DX contacts so is not a good idea. There will always be QRM on any selected frequency, of course, but that's ham radio! At least a QRQ calling frequency would give faster operators a known band locale to check for higher speed QSOs. Lower speed operators would know where they might find some good listening practice by possibly better operators in QSOs and hopefully learn some better CW operating procedures.

Since 7040 kHz is a recommended frequency for QRP contacts, when using 7042 kHz as a QRQ calling frequency, working frequencies should probably always be selected above that calling frequency to minimize QRM to the QRP operators.

Of course all of the frequencies listed will fall on or near some net or sked frequencies. Better operators will normally stay at least 1 kHz away from any established and working net frequencies. But wouldn't it be smarter for any such nets to move their net frequency just a few kilohertz away from any established QRQ calling frequencies? How about this? Hey, QRQ ops, let's give this a try!

Unlike a library where you can only keep something out a certain number of weeks and then either have to renew it or return it, with our Equipment Loan Program a Handiham member can keep the item out basically as long as they will use it. Most often a person will end up purchasing equipment while attending a hamfest and at that time will return the gear to us so

someone else can then use it. Just a couple months ago, someone returned a Ten-Tec Century 21 that had been out since sometime in 1988! In order to become qualified for the loan of equipment, a person must be up-to-date in their dues, been a member for a year, have gotten their license or upgraded with us, or attended our Radio Camp. The Handiham Manager can make exceptions by special request; for example, if a deserving member has not been a member for a year, or is enrolled in a class with a local club or in a Handiham online course and shows exceptional promise. During the length of the loan, the borrower must keep up current membership in Handihams.

The equipment we have for loan depends upon what is donated to us. Right now the donations have been way down and we do not have much available. We have a waiting list on which we put your name, request, phone number, email address, and the date of the equipment request. When we get an equipment donation, we ask our shop volunteers to check the gear out to make sure it is working. Then we go down the waiting list in order and hopefully make a member's wish for a rig come true!

Now, here is our dilemma.

Right now we have quite a long list of people waiting, but not much in the way of "WORKING" rigs to loan out. We need more hams to step up to the plate and help us out with donations of ham gear - rigs that can put Handiham members on the air, getting them off the bench and making them participants in the greater ham radio community. Over the past five years, donations of used gear have fallen off considerably. I think we are competing with online auctions and other donation programs, but there are other factors as well. For one thing, newer gear lasts longer than ever, since the solid-state technology is very reliable. So perhaps people are not replacing their gear as often. Then there is the economy. On the TV, they say it is wonderful, but it does not seem so when people have to spend so much on energy. That means less discretionary income to spend on ham gear. You can only imagine how difficult it is for a Handiham member on a fixed income to scrape enough together for a ham radio station. That's why the Equipment Program is so important. It can get deserving hams on the air.

Won't you please help? Give that ham gear you are not using to the Handiham Equipment Loan Program, so it can make someone happy and keep our bands active! Remember, it is tax-deductible to the fullest extent allowed by law. RESUME OF THE OLD OLD TIMER'S CLUB ACTIVITIES FOR THEIR FIRST YEAR ON THE AIR 1948

The O.O.T.C. started with thirteen members.

First meeting, January 29, 1948, we had in that historic round table the following stations: W3NUN, W1ZE, W1LBI, W4VA, W2UH, W2APN, W1ANA, W3FJU, W2TF and W1NQ, the Club's Secretary.

A letter of congratulations on the formation of the Old Old Timer's Club from Bill Parker G6BY was read at the second meeting on February 5th.

At the sixth weekly meeting on February 26th, two DX reports were read to all members, one from Herford in the British occupation zone in Germany, stating that the entire round table was being heard regularly in Germany, also one from Recife, Brazil, stating the same.

At the eighth meeting a note of thanks by all members present was recorded and sent to Helen Kasier of New Bedford, Massachusetts, for her donation of a large 400-page cloth bound record book for the Club minutes, together with a large loose leaf leather bound book for the filing of all original letters from the Club members, together with photographs, clippings, etc.

At the ninth meeting March 25th, Skipper Greene W1CPI was appointed the Official Club Custodian of all old time ham gear to be placed in his museum in Wakefield, Rhode Island.

At the eleventh regular meeting April 8th a very clear broadcast was made by Bill Parker G6BY from Weston Super-Mare, England, through the station of Skipper Greene W1CPI of Wakefield, Rhode Island. Bill extended greetings Trans-Oceanic to all the Club members and also felicitations to W1NQ on his 53th birthday.

The last regular get-together of the season was held on April 29th before the Summer shut down.

Our first casualty occurred with the death of W2GOX at 4:30 on the morning of July 17th, 1948. John Preston of Northport, Long Island. Pres became the first silent key of the 40-year Old Old Timer's Club at the age of 58 years.

This is the 27th round table of the O.O.T.C. and the last for the year 1948. Our Roster now stands at 41 members and has become a National Organization. These members will go down in Ham Radio History as the forerunners and pioneers in Amateur Radio.

No doubt the coming New Year, 1949, will witness the addition of several new members and each succeeding year an ever increasing number of members.

Let the entire membership of 41 active members prize their present position in Ham Radio very highly and dedicate their remaining years towards the advancement of the Art and the Comradship of their Fellow Man as signified by their Sheepskins laing on the Shack Wall.
